1909 Alco

I heard about the 1909 Alco the other night. The first thing that came to my mind was a massive steam locomotive. I couldn't imagine it to be a race car but what did I know! You see, Alco was the American Locomotive Company formed in 1901 from a number of smaller locomotive builders (kind of the GM of the railroads). I remembered that Alco originated what is called super power in the 1920s: a steam locomotive with a larger boiler mated to an enormous fire box supported by a 4-wheel trailing truck; high horsepower and unlimited steam for high speeds. A little research on the computer and I discovered that Alco did manufacture cars for a short time: first, French cars under license, and then their very own. They were also convinced to support a factory racing team.

My quest for enlightenment was fueled by a phone call I received from Al Velocci, a local historian and expert on the Long Island Motor Parkway. Al is co-author of Long Island Motor Parkway with Harold Kroplick. Al is trying to document the western terminus of the parkway which was here in Queens in Fresh Meadows, near Francis Lewis Boulevard and the LIE. Al has already documented every inch of the old Parkway but is hoping to find photos of the gate

house at the western terminus. He hoped I might have some information as I had documented what I could find of the parkway for a "City As History" course many years ago. Unfortunately, I was of little help but, in the ensuing conversation. Al brought up the return of the 1909 Alco to Long Island. Al's co-author, Harold Kroplick, has acquired the 1909 Alco 6 race car which won the Vanderbilt Cup in 1909 and again in 1910. The Alco was pretty much a stock touring car, stripped down, but it was able to outlast more exotic machinery to win both times. The Alco 6-cylinder automobile has a 690 cubic inch engine (that's a little more than 3 and 1/2 Big Healey engines), producing maybe one hundred horsepower. It has a 4-speed transmission, chain drive, two-wheel mechanical drum brakes, and a mechanical transmission drum brake. Harold Kroplick brought the car back from Belgium this January and it is now undergoing maintenance in CT before returning to Long Island roads. For more information see vanderbiltcupraces.com

I would love to hear it run but it might be a scary proposition to ride in it considering it's really only an engine and chassis with two seats perched on top. Needless to say, there are no seat belts or roll bar!

That's a wrap on this month. Stay positive – although spring feels slow to come this year, the Spring Equinox is behind us and warmer temperatures will be soon to follow!





Austin-Healey came into being in 1952 when Leonard Lord of Austin and Donald Healey met at the Earls Court Motor Show. As a result, the Healey 100 as it was entered became the Austin-Healey 100. The Austin-Healey 3000 was introduced to the public in March, 1959.
