

This Month in Healey History

MARCH by Baird Foster



1954—All-Female Team in Rally

An Austin-Healey 100, driven by Miss B. Haig and Miss E. Riddell, was 1st in Class and 7th Overall in the Paris-St. Raphael Rally in France.

1954—Sebring Class Win for 100S Prototype

In the Sebring 12-Hour Race, co-drivers Lance Macklin and George Huntoon finished 1st in Class and 3rd Overall in an Austin-Healey Prototype 100S. The car was running second to an OSCA driven by Stirling Moss until near the end of the race, a rocker arm broke, dropping the A-H to third. The Prototype had the normal 100 bodywork but incorporated many changes, such as non-standard Dunlop disc brakes front and rear. Also, there were extensive modifications to the engine, which would later form the basis for the 100S series of race cars built by the DHMC factory.

1962—BJ7 "Test" Production Ended

A limited "test" run of the 3000 MK II, Series BJ7, Sports Convertible was completed; full production began in June. This was the first Austin-Healey model to have windup side windows and a true convertible top (hood).

1964—Sprite MK III Production Began

Production of the Austin-Healey Sprite MK II (about 30,500 built) ended, and the Sprite MK III production began. Major changes for the new model included windup side windows (no more side-curtains!) and half-elliptic rear springs, replacing the quarter-elliptic springs of the previous models, for improved handling.

s I write this on February 25, it is snowing again. I am including no photos of snow or anything resembling snow for this issue as you all probably know what snow looks like. There are car related events on the horizon (see box).

Along the waterfront in Philly, opposite IKEA, is an American icon, the SS United States. The United States was completed in 1952, and is the fastest ocean liner of all time and, at 990', the largest ever built in the U.S. It still holds the Blue Riband for both east and west crossings of the Atlantic, taking the award from the first Queen Mary in 1952. Its maiden crossing took 3 days, 10 hours, 40 minutes at an average speed of 35.5 knots or 40.9 mph. Its true top speed was a military secret for years as it was designed to be converted to a troop ship in time of war. Out of service since 1969, it has been the focus of many schemes to put it to further use; the latest of which is to bring it to NYC for use as a floating hotel.







I forgot to bring that book along with me when I went down to Conclave in San Antonio, Texas in 2004. Bic Healey was there; I just had to get Bic's autograph, so I bought a 50th Anniversary Edition to have him sign. One mistake that I had noticed from the first edition that was still in the latest one was having the 1982 International Healey Meet in Snowmass, Colorado mistaken for Snowmass, California. I would have thought it would have been corrected in the up-dated version.

I just finished reading Geoff's fourth (and last) book, "The Healey Story", where his goal was to "set the record straight and dispense with many of the myths..." surrounding the cars and people involved. I could almost smell his pipe-smoke while reading that book. I have a feeling he didn't much care for Japanese automobiles (a comment about "helping the 'enemy" might have had something to do with that feeling). He didn't seem to mind German cars or engineering, though. I found this a bit odd, as he served in WWII against the Germans. He was writing this book when he died; had actually gotten the first draft done. Margot and their two daughters, Cecilia and Kate, put the finishing touches on it and got it published. My thanks to them, and to Bic for finishing DMH's "My World of Cars": without them, the "story" wouldn't be complete.

Truth be told, there were actually a couple of other reasons that I had dusted off these old books, and once dusted, I decided to re-read some of them. Why let a good dusting go to waste? Maybe I'll get to those reasons next month, when I figure out what they were.

The Brake Servo Tech Session was cancelled; Frank will attack that project on his own and let us know how it turns out. Otherwise, it could end up like last year's Spring Tour that took eight or nine weeks to pull off. Next up will be a Tech Session at Art and Joan Herkomers' in Oakland, NJ on Saturday, March 27th, where we will try to resurrect Art's Big Healey. This could be titled "It Won't Start".

A Unique, Chrome Shift Knob...

When I got my 1956 BN2 from my grandfather in July of 1978, it had a rather unique gearshift knob. It was fifteen years, at the Texas Healey Roundup in Lufkin, Texas in 1993 before I saw another shift knob like it. I saw another one on a modified 100 at Fall Fest in Duke Island Park in September of 2008. That was three in thirty years. It is a chrome knob with the Austin-Healey wings in the center with a stylized "A" above it and an "H" below. It very closely resembles the logo for the Oklahoma Austin-Healey Owners' Club. If I remember correctly, Rocky Santiago had driven the one to Round-up.

About a year ago, I came across several issues of older car magazines from the mid-fifties to the late sixties. Some of them had interesting articles. On pages 42-43 of Sports Car Graphic of July 1967 was a Road Test of the MG Midget Mk III (which is also the Mk IV Sprite), while on pages 76-77 was a Track Test of the Triumph GT6 Prototype. "The Mystery of the 200-miles-per-gallon Pogue Carburetor" was in the September 1953 issue of Cars. Also in this issue was "How to fix a ticket" and "...your suicide impulse."

What I found of more importance, though, were some of the period ads. For instance, on page 70 of the August 1966 issue of Sports Car Graphic was a full-page ad on the Austin-Healey Sprite (Square body) "...for under \$2000."

On page 14 of the April 1956 issue of Motor Trend was an ad for "... The New Austin-Healey 100... with 4-speed



transmission and bigger brakes..." introducing the BN2. That's a keeper.

Also, on page 78 of Sports Cars Illustrated for February 1960, there was an ad from Denis Ferranti Laminations, Ltd. offering detachable hard tops (from \$127.85) and sliding side curtains (at \$42.15 and \$46.36) for Healeys (both Sprite and 100/6), MGAs, and Jag XK150. On page 23 of this magazine was a full-page ad from BMC promoting the

new Austin Healey '3000' and the Sprite.

A full-page ad of the Austin-Healey "Love at First Sprite" Bugeye, with it's big sister the 3000, was featured on page 77 of the April 1960 Road & Track. I turned the page, and saw this little gem: A chrome, crested shift knob available from AMCO! The fine print also offered "windwings, sunvisors, floor carpets, luggage racks..." You get the picture. I wonder if the company is still in business? I wonder if they have any NOS? It seems that the gearshift knob was a period, after-market accessory. How much was it? In two different ads (pages 9 & 19 of Sports Cars Illustrated of 02/60), it listed for \$2.95. A gold-plated version could be had for \$5.95. Mystery solved. Does any one else have a car with this kind of knob on it? Does anyone have the gold-plated version? They were also available for Jaguars, MGs, Triumph Let me know. george crombie@yahoo.com


We didn't have any new members this month.

Simeone Museum's Founder Publishes The Spirit of Competition

he Simeone Museum isn't just a collection of winning sports cars, rather it delivers a narrowly-focused concept: how competition improves the breed through [amateur] racing. On display are champion classic and sports cars produced between 1900 and 1975. This period preceded the era of corporate sponsorship, when the cars & teams became totally separated from what was being sold to the public, conceived for an isolated purpose- corporate publicity. Little benefit from modern racing is derived by the motoring public.


The racers in Dr. Simeone's collection only bear the manufacturer's name: they are not adorned with sponsorship stickers plastered everywhere a camera's eye can see. Many were raced by the car company's founder(s), relatives, or a design-team member; but most competitors raced models purchased from a dealer's showroom, then modified to meet whatever class regulations were in effect at the time. Racing was for the pure enjoyment of competition or advancements in technology.

And the stories generated over this seven decades could go on forever. Having only opened the museum in 2008, the Doc has still found time to put down several hundred pages of lavishly-illustrated legend derived from personal interviews and his extensive library (not yet transferred to the museum). His book, appropriately entitled The Spirit of Competition has less than 200 unsold copies left in its first printing (which was released last fall).

Rather than shell out the \$175 for the non-leather bound version, you can capture many of the themes depicted there by viewing denoted enlarged photographs on display throughout the museum's tour route between the 16 dioramas depicting the world's most famous racing circuits of the era. Almost 25% are devoted to women in racing. One of

the two quotations facing entrants to the museum in raised, bold letters is by Janet Guthrie: "Racing is a matter of spirit, not strength." The 1938 Ford driven by NASCAR's first lady, Louise Smith, is on display- she won 38 races in it between 1945 & 1956.

Our Encounter kick-off bus trip to the Simeone Foundation Museum on Wednesday, August 11 will not only be a tour of fabulous cars, but a story-telling experience as well. As a forinstance, it was a quirk that put Craig Breedlove behind the wheel of the first Cobra Daytona produced, but ended up garnering 23 speed and endurance records at Bonneville in 1965. He was actually there to shake out the Goodyear-


