This Month in Healey History

April

1949 - Westland Class Winner in Mille Miglia

Tommy Wisdom and Geoff Healey drove a Healey Westland Roadster, GWD 43, to a first place in the Touring Car Class in the famed Italian Mille Miglia. Also entered was a Healey Elliott saloon, driven by Donald Healey and Geoff Price. The Elliott, 192 AC, finished fourth in the same class. This was the final competition event for these works-prepared cars.

1950 - Silverstone Competes in Sicily

At the Targa Florio road race in Sicily, Tommy Wisdom and Tony Hume drove a Healey Silverstone to fourth in the Unlimited Sports Class, sixteenth overall of 185 starters and the first British car in the final results.

The Silverstone, a stripped-down open two-seat race car, is perhaps the best-known of the Warwick-built cars. Only 105 of this Healey model were built, from early 1949 through September 1950. It was a car created and driven for the pure joy of safe, fast motoring.

1953 – The 100 Debuts in Manhattan

Following a successful United States debut at the World's Fair in Miami, Florida, the new Austin-Healey 100 appeared at the Second Annual International Motorsports Show at the Grand Central Palace in New York City. As in Florida, where the 100 was accorded the "Grand Premium Award," it was a big hit and was named the "International Show Car of 1953."







1960 – Sprites Sweep Class in Ireland

Six Austin-Healey Sprites finished first through sixth in class at the Circuit of Ireland rally. Adrian Boyd and M. Johnson came in first overall as well. Because the Sprite was introduced in the heyday of the "Big" Healey domination of international rallies, it didn't receive much rally development from Abingdon's Competition Department. Nearly all of the Sprites' rally successes were earned by private owners.

1996 – Donald M. Healey in IMHOF

On April 25, Donald Mitchell Healey C.B.E. (1898-1988) was inducted into the International Motorsports Hall of Fame in Talledega, Alabama. His friend, Carroll Shelby, presented the award to Donald's son Brian "Bic" Healey.



Blind Ambition

from the Automotive Hall of Fame Newsletter

Ralph Teetor (1890 - 1982) was one of the auto industry's most inventive and productive engineering geniuses, most notable for inventing the "Speedostat," known today as Cruise Control. Oh, and by the way, he was totally blind from the age of five.

Ralph R. Teetor's remarkable and enviable engineering and management career culminated with the presidency of the Perfect Circle Corporation as well as the presidency of the Society of Automotive Engineers. He held over 30 patents and was responsible for a wide variety of inventions or enhancements, from things as complicated as a select-gear system for an automotive transmission to things as simple as a fishing rod handle.

His most notable invention, however, was the cruise control device -- originally called the "Speedostat"-- which he first sold to Chrysler Corporation in 1958.

Teetor was also a talented craftsman, able to bring his ideas to life by fabricating precision parts himself in his own workshop – all without sight. Teetor once remarked that the greatest invention in his lifetime was the electric razor, for then he considered himself one hundred percent self-reliant.

"I am not handicapped, because I have never considered myself so," Teetor once said. "If anyone in the world has had more fun out of life than I have had, I should like to meet him. I am sure no one has enjoyed living more than I."

Ralph R. Teetor, one of the motor vehicle industry's most remarkable engineers, was inducted into the Automotive Hall of Fame in 1988.


TECH TIPS

for members, by members

Is your clutch disk stuck to your flywheel after a long storage? Does your car remain in gear even with the clutch pedal pushed in?

First check to make sure your slave cylinder is pushing 1/2" to 3/4". If so then your clutch disk may be stuck. A. Try turning the ignition with the clutch pedal pushed in, the car in gear and the e-brake off. The car will roll a bit, so be careful! If it doesn't let loose then go right to plan D. With a helper (in my case my wife) and plenty of run off room, jack the rear end of the car under the rear end just off the ground and with the e-brake off. Start the car in fourth gear and rev it up to about 2500 RPM's. Very important: push in the clutch pedal and give the signal to your helper to release the jack FULLY. Maybe a good idea to practice prior, so that the jack clears the underneath of the car as it moves forward. Either the clutch will let loose or it will stall the car. If it stalls the car, then most likely you will have to separate the engine and gearbox to free it.

Austin-Healey 100 among 21 Best Ever Timeless Designs

Classic Motorsports Magazine (www.classicmotorsports.net) March 2010, announced that automotive designer Peter Brock has selected 21 Icons of Design—revolutionary automobiles that shaped our modern world in the past 60 years. Included in his list of favorites is the Austin-Healey 100.

At age 19, Brock was the youngest designer ever hired by General Motors; he created the Corvette Sting Ray and is perhaps best known for his design of the Shelby Daytona Coupe, one of which won its class at the Le Mans 24-Hour Race. Peter Brock also began a racing team, Brock Racing Enterprises, and he successfully competed in the Datsun 240Z sports car and the 510.

Among the criteria Brock considered for his 21 choices were "the indefinable combination of design, engineering and sheer presence." To qualify, Brock noted that "a car must be beautiful, desirable, exciting or even cool, but it should also have been important enough to set new standards or somehow change history."

Of the Austin-Healey 100, he wrote, "The 100 prototype was an aesthetic masterpiece that immediately caught the sporting public's fancy when it debuted at the London Motor Show" [in 1952]. He noted that while not a great engineering feat, as it was mostly a selection of existing bits from the Austin factory parts bin, "it remains a good-



looking car that's great fun to drive."

For those who have experienced this icon of design, they know that Peter Brock has well-described the 100.

Other British cars on the list of 21 included the MG TC, the Jaguar XK120, the Mini Cooper, and the Jaguar E-Type.

Nearly 60 years after its introduction, Gerry Coker's timeless body styling of the Austin-Healey 100 remains an icon of automotive design.

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2010 Valve Cover Races

ENCOUNTER 2010

he AHSTC has been running valve cover races at Encounters since 2005. John Davies is the father of this heralded competition. The original rules were derived from those established in England by the Druids while taking breaks building their stone henges all over the hinterland. John constructed the regulation ramp with highly-automated starting gate.

Due to the popularity and creativity generated over the past few years (particularly by our younger participants), the 2010 competition will be expanded. Our goal remains to involve the club's junior participants and encourage family projects in the construction of a valve cover racer (VCR).

Two years ago, Jim Cox volunteered to serve as Chief Judge and will do so again for Encounter 2010's Philadelphia Region. Jim suggested, and the Committee as endorsed, the creation of two classes, each having Senior and Junior Divisions.

Competition under the original rules will be known as the **Regulation Class**. Here is a quick summary of those rules:

- 1. The VCR can be any length but the width must fit on the official AHSTC 14 inch wheel track;
- 2. The car must be constructed from a BMC valve cover and have 4 wheels;
- 3. Any style of wheel, bearing or lubrication is allowed. Wheel diameter is limited to 6 inches;
- 4. All motive force must be provided by gravity;
- 5. Wheel base is not to exceed 24 inches;
- 6. A part of the front wheels must cross the finish line ahead of the body;
- 7. No electrical or magnetic devices allowed on the VCR;
- 8. There is no construction material, weight or height limit on VCRs;

The new **Open Class** offers more latitude in creativity and construction: Cars that do not qualify for Regulation Class will compete here. Modifications that would put your VC racer in this class include:

- 1. Any VCRs with other than 4 wheels;
- 2. Any VCRs with wheels larger than 6 inches;
- 3. Any VCR longer than 24 inches but still able to rest properly at the starting line;
- 4. Any VCR with a body extending beyond the front wheels;
- 5. Any VCR deemed in the opinion of the Chief Judge to offer an unfair advantage against the participants in the Regulation Class;

ENCOUNTER 2010

General Competition Rules

- 1. In order to classify each VCR, a "Tech Inspection" will be held beginning 1 hour prior to the race. In true Gymkhana fashion, inspection stickers will be affixed prior to cuing up. Driver's names will be collected and driver classification assigned at that time;
- 2. In order to assist the Chief Judge and other personnel, name tags will be provided to the drivers which must be worn during the competition;
- 3. VCRs can continue to be shared among drivers of both Divisions within the same Class with appropriate notice to the Chief Judge for ease record keeping;
- 4. The double-elimination system will continue to be used for each Class/Division;
- 5. The results of the registration, classification and heat winners will be recorded on official forms to create a permanent record and reduce any clerical errors on the part of the organizers;
- 6. One award for each age division will be presented in both the Regulation and Open classes for a total of four awards;
- 7. Junior Division drivers will be under 12 years of age, Senior Division includes 12 years and older. Men and women are in the same class in both divisions for this competition;
- 8. The VCR must fit on the starting area of the AHSTC track (with the present hinged extension) in order to qualify to run;
- 9. VCRs must run through the finish line within the marked course for a valid run;
- 10. Creative design, decoration and personalization is encouraged!
- 11. The Chief Judge will review the conduct and results of the overall event annually and suggest any needed changes as appropriate for the next Encounter. Suggestions are always encouraged. The Chief Judge will be available to address any concerns. The decisions of the Chief Judge shall be considered final.

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Spin on Oil Filter

hat started out as a simple project to make changing the oil in a Healey simpler, as always, turns out to be harder and more complicated than expected. Tom Mulligan sent in this piece about his recent adventure. (editor)

To the right are two photos of the Moss Spin on oil filter installed on my late BJ8 Austin Healey.

After checking the alignment carefully I have determined that the part will function properly as all the oil passages line up correctly.

However, you can see that modifications are necessary to clear the block for the Moss unit.

Interestingly, I was replacing an older spin-on adapter that came with the car and was marked "Smitty". You can see that a prior owner had to notch the block a bit to fit that adaptor. The Moss part required further clearance which I decided to accomplish by beveling the adaptor rather than further modification to the block.
