




October is one of the best driving months for a Healey and I hope you have been out and having fun.



North Jersey sent a few Healeys, and an MG or two, (even a Triumph) out to Flemington, New Jersey on Saturday, September 7th for the annual FallFest All British Car & Motorcycle Show. This year, after a lot of looking around to find a suitable venue, the organizers (Larry Gersten and Allen Rosenberg) stumbled upon an ideal location, namely Liberty Village in Flemington. According to the numbers, there were 86 cars registered (very few pre-registered), almost swamping the folks at the registration table at times. There were the usual assortment of Little British Cars (LBCs); and even a couple of slightly bigger LBCs, like Jaguars. I even noticed one motorcycle in the parking lot, but it had disappeared before I had the chance to wander over to check it out. Amongst these LBCs, I counted 14 Healeys; 11 Big Healeys, and 3 Sprites. These Sprites are even littler than your typical LBC, but maybe not quite as little as the original Mini (of which there was one; but I digress...). I did not recognize the names of the owners of several of these Healeys.

(BN4), Bob Pense (BJ8), David & Karen (BT7), Dorsey Reading (BJ8), Ian Kessen (BT7), Roy Chaleff (BJ8), and Andy & Martha Smith (BT7). Also attending were Jim Vollmuth (TR3), Allen & Ginny Rosenberg (MGB), Ralph Scarfogliero (Modified MGA-V8), and John Moore. According to my notes, there were 3 generations of the Rosenberg family; Ann & Steve Feld brought along their grandson; and this was the second showing for Frank Dapiran's BN4, but it was the longest drive he has made in it so far.

The following day, September 8th, was the Warren Car Show. These two shows are always held back to back on the same weekend, and always the weekend after Labor Day, just so that you can put them on your calendar for next year, and the year after, and the year after that...I didn't make it to the Warren Show, so I can't report on who was there (or not there). This show generally draws around 300-plus vehicles of all makes and models, but the organizers group all British cars into one class, so it is really tough to bring home any hardware from this show, if that is your aim. However, if your goal is to get out in your favorite classic car and meet with a bunch of like-minded gearheads, this is definitely a show that is not to be missed. As always, pre-registration makes it so much easier on the organizers.




REGION | Harrisburg

The driving season is reaching its end but we hope to see you at our final events listed above - just watch out for the road hazards.



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

"DMH: MOTORING LEGEND" TIMELINE POSTER IS DISPLAYED IN THE HEALEY MUSEUM.

The DMH Memorial Fund, established in 1989 to "Remember a Friend," has recently added to the collection of Healey memorabilia at the Healey Museum in Vreeland, the Netherlands.

The items donated include the original art by Nick Beringer for the Donald Mitchell Healey Memorial stained glass window installed in May, 1993 in St. Michael's Church, Perranporth, Cornwall; a DMH 100th year plate prototype sample; a DMH timeline poster; and an original media kit used to promote the 50th Anniversary of the Austin-Healey in 2002.

The plate, also designed by Nick Beringer, was produced as a DMH Memorial Fund fundraiser during Healey's Centenary year in 1998, with a total production run of 150 numbered plates. Nick Beringer and Bic Healey designed the illustrated timeline poster entitled "DMH: Motoring Legend" depicting many of Donald Healey's lifetime achievements. It also was sold as a fundraiser. The media kit was professionally prepared and assembled by Fred Dabney (Carolinas Region of the AHCA) and distributed by the AHCA's 50th Anniversary Committee.

The DMH Memorial Fund Committee and the Healey Museum believe that these items help demonstrate the interest of Austin-Healey clubs in the preservation of the marque's history.

The DMH Memorial Fund also presented a cash contribution to the Healey Museum at the Healey Drivers Club International Meeting in Perranporth, Cornwall in May, 2013. AHCA Treasurer and DMH Memorial Fund Committee member Bev Sealand made the presentation to the museum's chairman, Hans van de Kerkhof.

The DMH Memorial Fund encourages club members and regions to support the Healey Museum Foundation financially to help with the gathering, preservation, and presentation of Healey history by the museum's dedicated staff. 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


