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

"Charlie's Web" by Joe Spear



he weather since April 20th has presented a deluge of rain, creating cancellations of outdoor activities. The club's tour to Grounds for Sculpture, an outdoor venue, in Hamilton, NJ, was cancelled twice because of rain, but will be rescheduled for September.

Club activities have been relegated to indoor events. Last month, the head of Ray Donovan's BJ8 was removed and sent out for repairs. After the pulling the head, Ray was faced with removing the temperature/oil gauge from the dash for repair. He was not able to hold the gauge steady while breaking the oil line loose with a flare nut wrench. I volunteered to come to his garage with a rubber-strap wrench to hold the gauge from turning, while breaking the flare nut loose. It took longer to drive there than to complete the job, but now he has sent the gauge for repairs.

Fourteen attended the meeting on May 16, and as usual, we enjoyed each other's company along with a good dinner.

I have been experiencing fuel delivery problems with my BT7 for about six months. Even though the tank was of full of gas, I am only able to drive about 75 miles before the fuel pump runs out of gas. At that point, it would only take about six and one-half gallons of fuel to fill it.

I dipped into the tank with a piece of wood to see how much gas was still in the tank when the pump stopped pumping gas, and found two and one-half inches of gas remaining. I took the trunk area apart to see what was happening with the gas tank, and found that the pick-up tube had been broken at one time, and was now held in place with JB Weld. My assumption was that the tube was not reaching the bottom of the tank to get all the gas available.

Solution time: I ordered a new gas tank as I did not trust JB Weld reacting well with ethanol. I know that many boats with Fiberglas gas tanks had failed in the past ten years as the resins would not stand up to ethanol, so I did not want a potential bomb in the trunk. Thursday was a welcome rain-free day, so I installed the new gas tank. It took longer to pump the existing gas out of the old tank than to install the new tank. The whole process took about an hour and a half to complete.

On Friday, May 20, I went to the Carlisle Import Car Show, where I purchased a new rear bumper, which I installed on my return. The car show was very well attended, with many cars and many vendors offering their wares for sale at decent prices.

We hope to see members at the Motors for Music car show June 5 at Fonthill in Doylestown, and at the Philadelphia Region's summer picnic at the home of Marty and Leo Kob. See e-Flashes for details.


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BLEEDLESS BRAKE LIGHT SWITCH REPLACEMENT

he brake light switch on my 1959 BT7 recently failed. This switch is located in the 5-way brake pipe connector just above the right front frame and below the generator (alternator in my case). To replace this switch, I learned how to do so bleedlessly, although not necessarily bloodlessly given the cramped location.

First, turn the master electric switch in the boot to the "Off" position. Open the brake fluid reservoir and cover tightly with a Saran type plastic wrap and secure with rubber band(s) to seal the brake system.

Place a rag or other suitable material under the 5-way connector to prevent brake


fluid from dripping on any painted surfaces. Then remove the two wires connected to the brake light switch and unscrew the switch itself. Fill the hole in the new switch with fresh brake fluid – an eye dropper or other similar device is useful to get the fluid into the small opening. Very little

fluid is needed to fill the hole.

Next, get a helper (human is best but a board of suitable length will do and save you a beer) who can apply very light pressure on the brake pedal while you screw the new switch into the connector. The pressure on the brake pedal should be only enough to bring the fluid level up to the brim of the opening in the 5-way connector. You will want to keep the hole in the switch upright as long as possible so the fluid has little opportunity to leak out. (BTW-Do not use anti-seize compound or Teflon tape on the switch threads.) Keeping the pressure on the brake pedal until the switch is about halfway into the threaded connector opening should be sufficient to insure no air seepage. Finish tightening with a spanner. Lastly, remove the plastic covering on the reservoir and reconnect the two wires to the switch (it doesn't matter which wire goes to which screw.)

This method prevents air from seeping into the brake system and also insures that the switch is activated by brake fluid and not by air. I have done this twice and neither time did the brake system need to be bled. (Thanks to Bob Pense and Larry Gerstner for this method.)


