



# FLEETWOOD HILLCLIMB FONDLY REMEMBERED

ehigh Valley Region member Ken Weidner grew up in Fleetwood PA, a small picturesque rural town in Berks County, about twenty-five miles Southwest of Allentown. It was Ken who provided The Flash with this story and accompanying pictures of a little-known historical event held in Fleetwood involving Austin Healeys and other classics; an event from years gone by, that few of Fleetwood's younger citizens will remember, but which nonetheless may be of interest to many of our Lehigh Valley Region members.

During the post-WWII years when driving English sport cars became all the rage, many owners enjoyed weekend rides, where they could drop the tops, open the throttles, and sometimes compete in local, small-town car rallies. Pennsylvania which has many "over-the-hill and through the dale" rural roads became especially well known for car rallies known as hill climbs.



Beginning in 1961 and continuing each summer thereafter for more than a decade, Fleetwood held its Hillclimb rally on a narrow, unusually winding route leading up a hill and heading south out of town. The mile-long, dirt-road course rose 350 feet from start to finish. Word spread among U.S. car rally enthusiast of this challenging course in Pennsylvania. Sports cars and drivers from all over the East Coast came to compete in what became known as "The Fleetwood Hillclimb" (Our own Ken and Cindy Beck recall participating in this Hillclimb.)

From his childhood, Ken Weidner fondly remembers riding his bicycle with his friends up to the Hillclimb's pre-rally organizing park to take in the many brightly colored sport cars, and talk to the drivers, all the while covering his ears from the scream of over-revved engines. From the car park, Ken would then head up to the starting line to watch the cars speed off one at a time to complete the course. Times were recorded and Ken's dad helped to note the best times and speeds, with fastest times crossing the line in just under 50 seconds. Ken's mother also helped out by providing food and beverages for the many drivers and spectators. Ken recalls that colorful programs, listing all cars and drivers, could be purchased for a quarter. (He says

collectors can still find old Fleetwood Hillclimb programs occasionally on EBay.) By 1972, new housing developments were sprouting up in Fleetwood including along the Hillclimb race route, and with the added civic growth, the well-known dirt road was to be paved over at last. Consequently, the annual summer Hillclimb was paused, and unfortunately this well-loved car enthusiast's tradition was never restarted.

In 2023, the citizens of Fleetwood celebrated their 150th anniversary of the town's incorporation in 1873. To mark the occasion, the



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
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town organized a big celebration; including holding a town-wide dance with a Nashville country band, and a carnival would be held in the park. The celebration included a parade

winding its way through the town center. In keeping with the event's historical theme, Ken's childhood friend Tim Williams suggested that a parade float would be a good way to honor the memory of the Fleetwood Hillclimb. Ideally, the Hillclimb float would feature a classic sports car representative of the original Hillclimb rally cars.

Ken tells us that while most of his old school chums dreamt of buying American muscle cars when they were old enough, Ken instead yearned for a British sports car like the ones that competed in his town's Hillclimbs. Years later Ken fulfilled his dream and purchased a classic 1960 Austin Healey Sprite, which he still loves to drive today. Naturally, Ken's classic Sprite would be a perfect addition to the Hillclimb float. On parade day, it was decorated with black race numbers and its headlights were tape over for an authentic rally look. Posters were mounted on the float mapping out the Fleetwood Hillclimb route. Other signs listed the fastest course times achieved, and vintage photos of the race were enlarged and attached to the back of the float. Hay bales and checkered flags completed the vintage look.

Parade day weather in September 2023 was perfect, and the route was lined with young and old alike. As Ken and his prized Sprite sped by atop the float, some fans in recalling the old rally days, yelled out, "We remember Hillclimb" or "Bring the Hillclimb Back!" Ken's elderly mother was there to cheer on the Hillclimb float, much like she cheered on the actual rally cars 60 years ago. Of course, Ken tossed candy to the youngsters in the crowd so they too would have their own Hillclimb memories. A great time was had by all!



# AHSTC Special Exhibit at AACA Museum in Hershey

hose who attended Encounter 2023 in Hershey this August were treated to a private tour of one of the largest antique car museums in the country.

The AACA museum is a 71,000 square foot three floor museum in Hershey filled with the most unique, special, and interesting cars in America. To say the least it is hard to get your car/marque into the museum, but AHSTC did it.

Fred Bennett who is a volunteer at the museum, Fred Sherk and the Harisburg region, worked with AACA museum curator Stan Sipko and Rob Kain for a special exhibition of the Austin-Healey Marque, that opened November 18th, 2023, and will close April 20th, 2024.

The original plan was to have the exhibition in 2022 to celebrate the 70th anniversary of the introduction of the 100. However, COVID changed the schedule.

A special gallery is dedicated entirely to the Healey marque and houses four Healeys that showcase the marque from the initial Austin-Healey 100 to a late model 3000, and an early Sprite Bugeye to a square body Sprite.

The gallery has descriptions about each of the car models and their relevance to the Marque.

In addition, the room is filled with Healey memorabilia, posters, and pictures that bring the marque to life. The items on display illustrate the impact the marque had on the consumer car landscape in the 1950's and 60's.

There is a good chance "you" are in the museum also, or a picture of you and your car. What does that mean? Well, you must go to the museum to find out.

The Austin- Healey Exhibition is great to see and experience and the club will be hosting an event at the museum, so stayed tuned for the date and time.

# AUCTION REPORT

I have often wondered how the value of "tribute" cars, of any kind, is determined and priced. I guess the simple answer is whatever the market will bear.

This alloy-bodied 1955 BN1, on Bring a Trailer, caught my attention for just that reason. It appears to be a very nice build with a Cape International alloy body and significant engine work to recreate the 100S specifications.

As to value vs price – that hasn't been settled conclusively yet. This car was also offered for sale on BaT in August 2022 and was a reserve not met (RNM) at \$86k. It again failed to sell during this auction, in October of this year, and was an RNM at \$90k.So, the market seems to have established its value, but the seller appears to disagree. I am sure the cost to build this car far exceeds the offers made to date.

The commenters seemed to like the car very much and there wasn't much nit picking as the car was recognized for what it is. See what you think after reading the comments at:



Many of the commenters placed the value at closer to \$200k, yet the Sports Car Market auction sale guide puts the 1951 model at a high range of  $\sim$ \$125k. Perhaps the replacement engine hurt the sale. In my opinion, the seller could have benefited from a better presentation and more (and better) photos, as some commented. Presentation matters in on-line auctions. See what you think.
