However, I've borrowed the text, with Pam Preston's permission, from her email sent to the Harrisburg Region on January 14, 2024, as follows:










riting this article for The Flash brought to my mind the 1940 movie, "His Girl Friday, starring Cary Grant and Rosalind Russell. They play rival reporters who do a lot of ripping their copy out of their typewriters due to rapidly changing developments in a prison break story. (It is a comedy.) That is like where I'm at now: my originally planned article is saved, and I've started a new one due to changing developments. (Albeit that's not as dramatic as ripping the page out of a typewriter!). Let me explain...

It all started when I opened Howard Kroplick's Vanderbilt Cup Races Newsletter of Saturday, Jan. 20, 2024, and found a photo of LI member Skip Norsic's new storage building in Southampton. The building is used to store the trucks used in his business. It stands on the site of the now defunct Long Island Automotive Museum. Skip hoped to rehabilitate the original building, which was a Quonset hut, but the building was too far gone. An ingenious solution was to replicate the façade of the old building and build a new building behind it. (Quonset huts, with their distinctive semi-cylindrical cross section, were first deployed at Quonset Point, RI at

the Davisville Naval Construction Battalion Center. They filled a need for a lightweight prefabricated structure in World War II that could be shipped anywhere and put together easily. They were made of corrugated galvanized steel. 150,00 or more were made during the war, and afterwards the surplus was sold to the public. Many are still standing and used for businesses, homes, military museums, etc.)

As a child, Skip would disappear from his family's property and reappear next door at the car museum. So, you can see why this place holds special memories for him.

The museum was the creation of Henry Austin Clark (1917-1990). He was the son of the treasurer of the Cuban American Sugar Co., "Jack Frost" brand. Henry's first old car, a 1915 Model T, was purchased by him at age 11. When he returned from military service in World War II, he began planning a place to show some of his cars. The Automotive Museum of Long Island on County Road 39 in Southampton opened in 1948. It closed in 1980 after most of the collection had been auctioned off. There is a model of what it was like in its heyday in the new building.

Does anyone reading this remember the Museum? Did anyone visit it? Let me know.

DO'S AND DON'TS WHEN REPLACING FRONT BEARINGS!

'm a Lehigh Region member involved in a long-term project to restore a 1960 AH 3000. Winter cold forced me to retreat to my warm basement workshop where I'm currently rehabilitating my BT7's front hubs, including installing new brake calipers, disks and roller bearings. As a novice mechanic, quite eager but inexperienced, I'm confident that since I was able to change-out my front bearings, then so can you. The steps for bearing refit described below are specific to a 3000 Mark 1 with wire wheels and disk brakes, but I believe they are sufficiently generic to also apply to later models.

In writing this article, I relied heavily on the official Austin-Healey 100 and 3000 Workshop Manual Issue 6 issued by BMC Service Ltd. I urge you to obtain this manual, if for no other reason, then for the wonderful exploded-view illustrations showing inner workings for much of our beloved 3000s including the front hub assemblies. (These fascinating drawings are often reproduced elsewhere such as in the Moss catalog.) So let's get started, first working one front hub at a time, we will remove and dismantle the bearings:

1. Block the rear wheels for safety. Jack the front wheel off the ground. (I use a pump jack and two jack stands for secure lifting.) To check for bearing wear, excessive movement between the brake disk and the hub on the axel is a good indicator. Should a

pronounced movement be apparent, (or if a squealing sound is heard in the front wheels when driving) the front bearings should be replaced.

- 2. Remove the knock-off hubs and pull the tire and wheel off the hub.
- 3. Remove the brake caliper from the wheel assembly and brake disk. (I tied back the brake lines for more room.) Extract the aluminum grease cup from within the hub. (The manual calls for a special tool for this, but in my case, needle nose pliers work just fine.)
- 4. Straighten the ends of the cotter pin and pry it out through the hole opposite the pin in the hub. Next, remove the large 23 mm nut and flat washer from the axle. (I used a 1 1/4" SAE socket instead of a metric socket. It worked fine.
- 5. Remove the hub from the axle using a bearing puller. Don't hammer against the brake disk to remove it because such pounding covuld bend the disk. (That happened to me but it wasn't a problem since I was replacing the disks in any event.) The hub is then withdrawn, complete with the inner and outer bearings and rubber oil seal still attached.

- 6. First, get acquainted with the layout of the bearings. I secured the hub to my workbench where I could work on both the inner and outer bearings. The inner bearing is the larger of the two and is located closest to the brake disk end of the hub, whereas the smaller outer bearing is located furthest from the disk. The bearings themselves are made up of two pieces an inner roller portion and an outer race.
- 7. Withdraw the inner roller portion of the outer bearing together with its adjustment shims. (These are very thin washers about 1 1/2" in diameter. It varies but I had three such shims in my hub.) Remove the rubber oil seal from the inner end of the hub and withdraw the inner roller portion of the outer bearing together with the distance piece. (This is a hollow, cone-shaped steel barrel about 2" long.) I found that the inner roller portion could be removed easily by hand. However, the manual lists special tools for removing the outer race rings.

Since I didn't have these tools, instead I used a common bearing puller on the outer races. Big mistake! After much huffing, puffing, and a little cursing, I gave up on the bearing puller. Discouraged by my lack of progress, I cleaned the inner hub of grease, only to find an obstruction, a low ridge of steel around the inside

circumference of the hub which prevented extraction of the bearing outer race. A solution presented itself. Further cleaning revealed two small slots on the inside edge of the ridge. Then, using a common drift punch inserted into one of the slots, I easily hammered out both the inner and outer bearing outer races. Success!

End-float movement in a Healey's front bearings must be checked and adjusted whenever the hub has been dismantled. End-float is adjustable by means of adding (or removing) the aforementioned shims. To reassemble:

- 1. Insert the outer race of each bearing into the hub using a rubber mallet and drift punch. Insert the inner roller portion of the inner bearing and distance spacer cone, making sure to pack each bearing with recommended grease. (A simple way to grease a new bearing is to smear grease in the palm of your hand and drag the bearing through the grease several times while rotating it with each pass.)
- 2. Fit the rubber oil seal to the hub and mount the hub assembly back onto the axle. Position the inner roller portion of the outer bearing, packed with grease without fitting shims at this stage.
- 3. Refit the large 23 mm nut and flat washer back onto the axle. Tighten the nut while at the same time rotate the hub back and forth until there is noticeable drag. This ensures that the bearing outer races are properly seated.
- 4. Unscrew and remove the 23 mm axle nut. Extract the washer and the roller portion of the outer bearing. Insert a sufficient number of shims to produce visible end movement. Note the number of shims used. Replace the roller portion and the washer, and tighten the 23 mm axle nut.

- 5. Measure the amount of end movement in the bearings. Unscrew and remove the 23 mm axle nut. Extract the washer and roller portion of the outer bearing. Reduce the number of shims to eliminate end-float movement while still allowing the hub to rotate freely. Using a torque wrench, tighten the axle nut to 40 to 70 lb./ft. of torque. This range of torque is so the hub may be aligned with the cotter pin hole in the axle.
 - 6. Insert a new cotter pin through the hole in the axle nut and spread its tines.
- 7. Remove any surplus grease and, using needle nose pliers, press the aluminum grease cap up against the outer bearing. Do not put grease in the cap.
- 8. Replace the caliper assembly and tighten the securing bolts to between 45 to 50 lb./ft. of torque. Refit and if necessary, bleed the brake lines.
 - 9. Refit the tire and wheel, and tighten the knock-off hubs.
 - 10. Repeat all the above for the front wheel bearings on the other side.



I guess that, among other topics, one of the purposes was to try to come up with ideas on how to generate more enthusiasm, and greater participation from members. This was a very good idea, with lofty goals and really no downside that I could detect. Whoa! Let's slam on the brakes for just a minute.

Do I sense that the solution to all of this boiled down to scheduling the very next Annual AHSTC Encounter to coincide with AHCA's very next Annual Conclave? There are 52 and a half weeks in the year, and both of these large Healey clubs chose to start their respective annual meets at the same time – ON THE SAME DAY (AHCA is the largest – both geographically and numerically – Austin-Healey club in North America; while AHSTC is holding its own at third)! y now you know Ocean City, NJ is our happy place and from September 15-19, 2024, the Philadelphia Region is hosting Encounter 2024. All the usual club events are being planned, plus a number of self-directed activities.

There will be some free time during Encounter, and we're hoping you extend your stay to take advantage of the many nearby attractions. Since your condominium units have full kitchens, your extended stay should cost less than a typical vacation weekend 'down the shore'. Here is a highlight of a few of the places to visit:

Ocean City Historical Museum


Located downtown, this little gem traces the city's history starting in 1879 when four Methodist ministers set out to establish a resort based on Christian values. The first boardwalk was opened in 1887 and experienced numerous iterations. Learn about the merchant ship, Sindia and view many relics she carried from Japan. A section is devoted to Grace Kelly, whose family spent their summers in OCNJ (remember 'Kelly for Brickwork' tee-shirts in the 50's and 60's?). Her career in cinema and marriage to the Prince of Monaco are included.


• Lucy The Elephant

• Absecon Lighthouse

At 117' tall (228 steps), it's the tallest one in NJ, and third highest masonry lighthouse in the US. The Fresnel lenses were illuminated for the first time in 1857, marking the Absecon inlet at the north end of Atlantic City, just a few miles north of Lucy. abseconlighthouse.com



• Harriet Tubman Museum

Cape May was an instrumental element of the underground railroad. Harriet spent several years working there to fund her efforts guiding slaves northward. The museum Is nestled among three buildings that supported the migration. It's only three rooms. Guided tour at noon only. Self-guided tours hourly, best to make reservations a day or so in advance.

• Wheaton Glass Museum

Southern NJ is the birthplace of America's glass industry (1739). The area offered all the natural resources needed: wood, sand, silica, and soda ash. Located in the pine barrens about 30 miles from OC, pharmacist Dr. Wheaton began making his own bottles in Millville in 1888. His grandson's life goal was to establish a community at the turn of the century that included a museum of area artisan's work that rivaled the one in Corning, NY (which displayed a lot of NJ-produced works). The 'village' wasn't opened until 1973. It has grown to 45 acres and 18 buildings. Glassblowing demonstrations are held daily. There are a number of shops offering tons of crafts, a holiday shop, as well as glass and pottery in all shapes and forms.

• Aviation Hall of Fame & Museum

Located in Teterboro, it is open Wednesday - Saturday. Reservations recommended.

Displays include the rocket engine that propelled the X-15 to incredible speed and height records as well as the world's first hovercraft. There's an interactive aerodynamics exhibit: Fundamentals of Flight.

AUCTION REPORT

ere is another **100M** auction that provides valuable insight into the on-line auction process for anyone, regardless of the car make model or year. I have reported on 100M sales in recent Flash editions, perhaps disproportionately so. In the Healey community it seems these cars draw the most attention and the most scrutiny, which is useful to understand when buying or selling on-line.

This 100M is a very nice car with great curb appeal and it was first offered on Bring a Trailor in November 2023 when it was a reserve not met (RNM) at \$90.5k. One-Hundred M's are known to go for twice that much. The commenters questioned many aspects of the car's originality and authenticity, which is so often the case with these cars. To the seller's great credit this feedback was taken with a positive and courteous attitude.

The car was re-listed on BaT in December 2023 revealing that it has a replacement chassis. It again was a RNM at \$92k. So, the seller believes this car I worth more. However, one of the risks of selling on-line is that the auction history is available forever and the car's "value" is established in the minds of many collectors or would-be buyers. Read the comments in both listings and see what you think.


