



his month's article begins like last month's did: with a change of plans. You can blame it on Joe Curto. He emailed me two black and white photos of Bridgehampton racetrack from 1963. One is of Dan Gurney in a Ford Cobra, the other is a shot of the cars taken as seen from the "bridge", an overpass for foot traffic to safely cross the racetrack. The photos came to Joe via the photographer, Tom Abbe. Tom and his brother Eli hid themselves on the bridge before the race began and then popped up to take one of the photos. Tom has a copyright on the photos, and we thank him for letting us use them. In the 1990's our club rented the track, and we had a great time there. Besides myself, I remember Bob Maichin and Frank Filangeri being there. The track in Tom's pictures looks the same as I remember except the track surface was much rougher by the time we went. The people in charge of the track allowed me to take my 11-year-old son for a lap or two when no one else was using it. Fast forward 10 years later when he wanted to drive the Healey, his comment then was, "How can anyone drive this thing?".

Tom Abbe also sent me a link to the results of the 1963 Bridgehampton 500 km Race which is the race that is shown in the two photos he sent. It's interesting to see the variety of cars involved, some very powerful and fast, and others not so much. From the pictures you can see the three Cobras, two of which were ahead from the beginning and remained so. Besides the Cobras, there were Jaguars, Corvettes, Porsches, Ferraris AND an MGB that wound up a non-starter. We were unable to include the race results sheet here so I will just include some highlights. One is the number of famous racing names. There was Dan Gurney who won the race with 110 laps, totaling 314.6 miles, in 3 hours 26 minutes 29.8 seconds. He was a graduate of Manhasset HS before





his family moved to California. He had a long career in racing. His list of accomplishments is so long, you should just look him up! Mark Donohue, another iconic racing personality, was driving a TVR Grantura MK3 that day. Ken Miles was the driver of Vic Damone's car. Ken Miles was a British driver who moved to the US in 1952. In 1953 he designed an MG Special that won 14 victories in SCCA racing in CA. He designed a second MG Special known as the Flying Shingle. He also put a Porsche 550S engine and gearbox in a Cooper chassis which was known as the Pooper. He was the chief test driver for Shelby-American in 1963. Then there's Don Yenko who modified Corvairs (the Stinger) Camaros, and other Chevrolet cars by adding L-72 engines.

The Bridgehampton Racing Heritage Group and the Bridgehampton Museum will be having an exhibit of 100+ years of racing at Bridgehampton at the Museum which is on Main Street. Opening day will be in June. There will be frequently changing exhibits of film, photography, programs and posters. I will be sending out updates as they become available.

The Troegs brewery is quite large. Many brew tanks and associated equipment. A wide variety of beers were available, all good by the group's comments. Food was ordered cafeteria style. Thanks to the Harrisburg Region for reserving the tables for us.

The AACA museum was only about ten minutes away from the brewery. Admission costs were covered by AHSTC. The star attraction for our group of course was their Austin Healey display. This will be featured in their rotating display area until April 20, 2024. The Healey display contains four cars which spanned the Healey manufacturing period: a 100 M (1956); a 3000 (1965); a Bugeye Sprite (1959); and a square body Sprite (1966). In addition, the display contained much material relating to the history of the Austin Healey.

The museum contained many other historic automobiles. Those manufactured by Preston Tucker in 1948 were probably some of the rarest exhibited since only 51 were ever produced. Historic re-creations of a period soda shop, a diner, and several car dealerships were very well done. In addition, a large O-gauge railroad layout was excellent.





#### **BEGINNINGS OF RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE CHARITIES**

Working as a pediatric oncologist at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia in the 1970s, Dr. Audrey E. Evans saw families spend night after night in the hospital while their children received life-saving medical treatment. She knew there had to be a better way and envisioned a house where families could stay during these stressful and uncertain times.

At the same time, the Philadelphia Eagles were raising funds in support of player Fred Hill, whose daughter, Kim, was in treatment for leukemia at St. Christopher's Hospital for Children. When Eagles' General Manager Jimmy Murray approached St. Christopher's about making a donation, Dr. Lawrence Naiman suggested there was an even greater need for funds resting with Dr. Evans. Mr. Murray met Dr. Evans and became a champion for her cause. He approached Don Tuckerman and Stanley Elkman of Elkman Advertising, which represented McDonald's, with the idea that the company could offer the proceeds from their Shamrock Shake sales to benefit this new house. McDonald's agreed, and the first Ronald McDonald House was born in Philadelphia on October 15, 1974.

Thanks to the generosity of dedicated donors, the Ronald McDonald House has grown from a single idea to the model for over 375 Houses worldwide. The Chestnut Street House is in a historic mansion which was expanded in 1995 and again in 2019 with the addition of the Jill and Alan B. Miller Tower which more than doubled its capacity. This House accommodates 127 families each night. Our second House opened in 2008 at the corner of Front Street

and Erie Avenue and accommodates 20 families each night. Beyond the walls of our Houses, we serve children and families through three Ronald McDonald Family Rooms, a Ronald McDonald Care Mobile, and Ronald McDonald Camp which began offering an integrated camp experience for children with cancer and their siblings in 1986.

# **Spare Parts & Tools**

(For On-The-Road Remedies of Healey Character Faults)

s you get ready for spring 2024 driving season, now is the time to check your carry-on repair kit to be sure it contains what you may need to get back on the road if you or your driving friends experience a Healey breakdown. These types of lists have been around and published since Healeys were first produced and this is a compilation of several lists subject to the anonymous North Jersey author's editorial prerogative and personal experiences. This list has no guarantee of accuracy or completeness – your results will vary.

### TOOLS

Shop manual ("reassembly is reverse of disassembly")

Screwdrivers - Flat, Phillips, Posidriv (BJ8) - large & small sizes (except the one you'll need)

Open end or combination Wrenches - 1/4, 5/16, 3/8, 7/16, ½, 9/16, 5/8, 11/16, Whitworth/BSF (100-4)

Adjustable Wrench (aka "Crescent") (also doubles as a hammer, of course)

Sockets (incl. spark plug), ratchet, and extensions (helps if drive size matches)

Hex keys

Vise grips (for the inevitable stripped heads)

Pliers - regular - diagonal cutters - needle nose - channel-locks

Stanley knife (cut away from anything with a blood supply)

Feeler gauge (to confirm your eyeball estimate)

Jack and 1'X1' wood base (it can be muddy out there)

Multimeter and instructions (volts vs amps vs ohms)

Jumper cables (double check polarity – watch for conversions to negative earth)

Flashlight aka "torch" (No need to be out at night said Mr. Lucas)

# **SUPPLIES**

Nitrile gloves (Grease under your fingernails at the country club is not a good look)

Electrical tape

Duct tape (this and a big hammer should fix anything)

Fix-a-flat or Slime (warning labels are SCARY!)

JB Weld (when duct tape is not enough)

2-3 feet #18 insulated electric wire

1' length of wire coat hanger (long-serving model of an exhaust hanger)

Sandpaper

3'X3' plastic tarp section (beats lying in the mud)

WD-40 (What was wrong with WD39?)

AAA Card (You didn't forget your cell phone, did you?)

Collapsible gas can or emergency fuel pouch (Borrowing one at a gas station = Mission Impossible!)

## SPARE PARTS

Fuel pump

Tire tube (ever try to find one at Pep Boys?)

It's a non-running car and looking at the photos it appears to be a good candidate for a full restoration. Of course, making that determination from photos is difficult at best, but one of the positives about the BaT auction process is that there are usually many, many photos. The seller is a little light on photos in this case, in my opinion, but there are enough here to get a pretty good sense of what you are getting into. Follow the link and see what you think.


