Tech Tip – 4 Way Hazard Flashers for Your Healey

I have found myself in a situation wishing that my 1967 Austin Healey 3000 BJ8 double light model had 4-way emergency flashers like my 1969 Sprite has. I was on a tour when another member's Healey broke down and I was behind them on the shoulder assessing the situation. This started me thinking, how hard could it be to add a 4-way flasher switch?

For the BJ8 double light wiring, it is a relatively straightforward task. It may or may not apply to other Healey models. The turn signals work by taking power through a flasher relay, then the turn signal switch diverts that now on/off/on/off power to the right or left turn signal circuit. Each side's front and rear turn signals are interconnected in the wiring harness, so if you add a power connection with a flasher to any point in both the right and left turn signal wiring, you would be able to flash all 4 turn signal lights at the same time. An indicator light added to that circuit gives visual indication of the flasher operation on your dashboard. On the BJ8 double light cars it is just that simple.

The wiring harness on the driver's side firewall contains the turn signal wiring. The left and right turn signal wires are next to each other, each with a 4-port Lucas double bullet connector coupling. The power wire from the turn signal switch comes into each coupling and the front and rear turn signal light wires come out of it. That means there is an available fourth connection within the coupling to install the flasher wire. One wire from the flasher switch goes into the right turn signal bullet connector, the other wire goes to the left. If you install the flasher assembly under the dash and use the correct color-coded wires to connect to the harness, it is nearly impossible to spot the non-original wiring unless you know what you are looking for.

To provide power to the flasher system there is a single Lucas bullet connector on a purple wire under the dash behind the center console. This circuit was intended for the optional cigarette lighter and is powered even when the car is off. From this connector, the wiring goes to an in-line fuse, to a 2-wire flasher relay, to a DPDT toggle switch. This DPDT (double pole – double throw) switch has two power inlets and diverts each power inlet to a separate power outlet. Note: the DPDT switch that you use must be able to separate the two turn signal wire circuits, because if you connect them together you will have 4-way flashers whenever you use your turn signals! The wire from the flasher relay is connected to both input terminals of the toggle switch. I ran the wires from each of the two output terminals through the firewall and connected these wires to the open terminal on each of the two turn signal wiring couplers. I also connected one of the output terminals of the toggle switch (doesn't matter which one) to the indicator light.

I went a little further, adding a double bullet connector to the power supply, and added a wire to power a cigarette lighter outlet and a digital voltmeter/USB outlet unit. The voltmeter that I used includes a switch so that you can turn it off when you are not using it so that it doesn't drain the car's battery. I mounted the flasher switch, indicator light, 12V power port and USB/voltmeter in the center console where the radio speaker used to be.

So that's it – a (relatively) simple 4-way flasher addition for the Healey. I hope I never have to use them, but it is nice to know that they are there. I know I will use the voltmeter to monitor the car's battery, and the USB ports to charge my phone while I am using it as a GPS.

Here are some of the parts that I found on Amazon that apply to this build. As you can see, I had to buy multi-packs of some components, so I have some extra components. I also have a supply of the correct turn signal wires, green with white stripe and green with red stripe. Contact me at chucknsueo@yahoo.com if you need these parts.


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I separated the speaker grille from the surround. It just pops right out.



I fabricated a piece of metal with the holes for the different electrical components to fit the speaker grille surround and covered it in vinyl to match the dash.




This is all the wiring needed to install the flashers.

Turn signal wiring in the engine bay. The green with red wire and green with white wire in the middle of the photo are the added wires.




Closeup of the flasher wires in the engine bay. They look like they belong there.

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
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We have a very nice Big Healey, BN7, and a very nice Bugeye this month. Both cars sold for, what I believe to be, the high end of the price range for these models today. One is a beautifully restored 1962 3000 BN7 MkII, and the other is a very nice 1959 Bugeye Sprite with an upgraded drivetrain. Both were recently offered on Bring a Trailer (BaT),

First let's look at the 1962 3000 BN7

The car sold for \$99.75k, including the buyer's premium. Two-seaters, such as this, are rare cars with 355 made. That's rarer than a factory 100M. However, they never approached the pricing of the M's, as far as I know. The Keith Martin Price Guide, which tracks many auctions, has the price range for this model from \$50 to \$70k. Having said that, the best cars tend to routinely exceed price guides and average auction results, and I suspect that is what we have here. The comments during the auction seem to agree, and everyone loves Healey blue!

It sold on BaT for \$27,400 including the buyer's premium. Some of you may think you are experiencing Deja Vue if you read last month's Flash, which featured an almost identical 1959 Bugeye, albeit unmodified, and which sold at a very similar price. The two cars offer an interesting side-by-side comparison of a stock and modified car.

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
