North Jersey Region's Fundraising for Habitat for Humanity**

British Car Clubs - Building Bright Futures began in 2024 when a few leaders of New England British car clubs sent a suggestion to many other British car clubs that on one weekend in May, clubs hold fundraising events for their locale Habitat for Humanity local affiliate. The weekend of 2025 was May 17-18.

Our North Jersey Region decided to support British Car Clubs - Building Bright Futures this year. On Sunday, May 18, the sun shone, and the wind blew (really, really blew) and we held a British car show at The Greater Middlesex/Morris Habitat for Humanity Restore in Randolph, NJ. Instead of a show registration fee, we asked for a \$25 or more donation to Habitat. Donations totaled about \$1400.

We promoted it to other area British Car Clubs and had almost 30 cars show up. There were Austin Healeys, Jaguars, MGs, Minis, a TVR and an Aston Martin, (See photo.)

This Habitat Restore is normally closed on Sundays but opens from 9AM-2PM just for our show. Habitat provided coffee, tea and bagels and was

very supportive of the event. We attracted many customers because of the show, and many brought items from the Restore. The Restore sold over \$5300 of goods by opening that day as well as introduced the Restore to many who were unfamiliar with it. Our club therefore helped to raise over \$6700 for The Greater Middlesex/Morris Habitat for Humanity.

Thanks go to all members who helped organize, conduct and donate to this event, i.e., Pat Venezia, Vickie Hurst, Jim Foster, Bob Rudolph, Steve and Lynn Jekogian, Rich Ippoliti, Theo Padavano, Paul and Eileen Rust, Larry Gersten, Rudy Hyzer and Ann Feld. We also had great support from the President of the Jaguar Auto Group, who successfully promoted the event among his club members.

- On Sunday, July 20, the **Newtown car show** will be held beginning at 9 a.m.

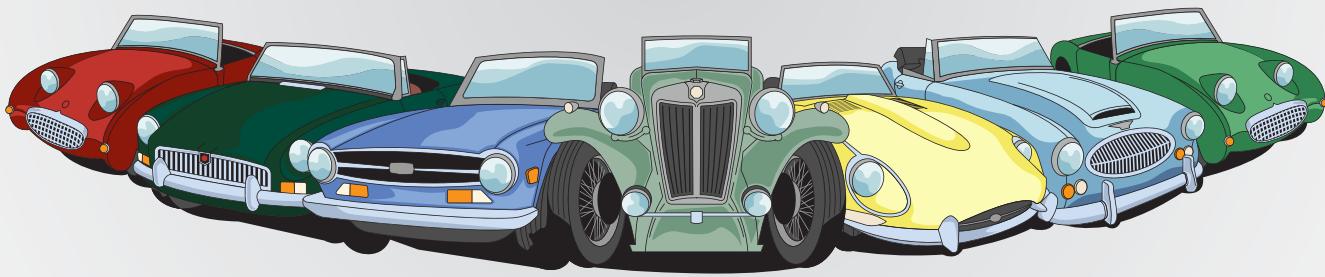
Try to come out to these shows.

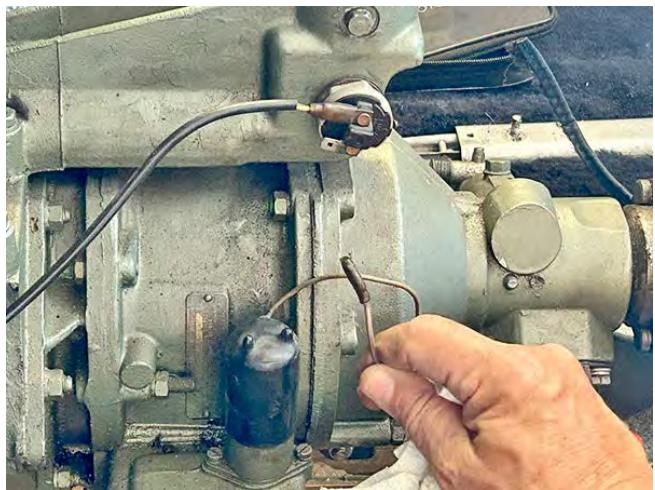
PROTECTING HISTORY™

This month we had two tech sessions at the Chuck Ott homestead.

1. Sorting out problems with the overdrive on a BJ8
2. Fixing the brakes on Chucks Square bodied Sprite.

Thanks to chuck for his notes and photo for the overdrive tech session.

The first of two tech sessions at Chuck Ott's garage was attended by Pennie Haase, Steve Keating, Alex Heckert and Rich Hinterleiter. Steve wanted to learn how to troubleshoot an overdrive because his BJ8's overdrive is not working. Fortunately for the tech session Chuck's BJ8's overdrive recently stopped working so this was perfect timing and afforded us an opportunity to go through and steps, educating Steve and correcting the problem. The problem turned out to be corroded electrical connections in the new wiring harness that had just "recently" been installed 10 years ago(!). There was no power to the gear switch when we started, which is the switch that ensures you are in 3rd or 4th gear before the overdrive engaged and is the final connection before the solenoid. Starting from the dash switch we unplugged and checked and re-installed the terminals in all of the components as we checked them for voltage. By the time we got to the gear switch again, it had power, but still no power was getting to the solenoid. Unplugging the solenoid wire's spade terminal at the gear switch, cleaning it and reconnecting it fixed the problem and now the solenoid clicks in and out as it should.



Pennie had mentioned that she wanted to learn how to bleed brakes, so we also bled the brakes and clutch as a team on Chuck's BJ8. We had one person watching the reservoir level, one person actuating the brake or clutch pedal, and one person operating the bleeder valve. While doing this we kept bleeding until we had an empty brake/clutch fluid reservoir. This gave Chuck the opportunity to install a new brake/clutch fluid reservoir. There was nothing wrong with the old reservoir other than it was shabby looking and brought down the appearance of the engine compartment. It was once shiny black but brake fluid spills over the years had caused rust and peeling paint. The new reservoir finish is supposedly impervious to brake fluid, allowing it to stay shiny looking for years.

The weather was great for the tech session and the afternoon was fun and productive.

Troubleshooting the overdrive is done with the transmission tunnel off, which is a fair amount of work. This wire connection was not passing current, causing the overdrive solenoid not to engage. See the picture.

Bleeding the clutch on a BJ8 isn't too bad with the transmission tunnel off. However, it took four hands to undo the brake fluid connections at the bottom of the reservoir.

For the second tech session on the Sprite, it was just Chuck and Nigel on Saturday May 17th. It was another sunny day, and Nigel came down from West Chester in his TVR Chimaera.

The brakes came off easily enough but removing the "o" ring seals which were causing the fluid leak proved to be more difficult than expected. Chuck fought hard with his new pulling gear but in the end, we had to resort to a few swift clouts with the left-handed screwdriver...AKA the hammer!

With these removed it was a simple job to re-install the new brake shoes once we figured out which way around the

springs for the hand brake attached. This was a fiddly mechanism, and we dismantled the passenger side brakes to copy the re-assembly format. That said, we still needed an extra pair of hands to get everything to fit properly.

All that was left was to check the installation out on a brief test drive which took us 20 minutes around Chuck's neighborhood.

All in all, the process took us about three hours which included a tour around Chuck's new pole barn that will house his growing list of vehicles.

This was a fun project but once again reminds us of the importance of an extra pair of hands.

Remote Clutch Speed Bleeder

Every owner of a Healey dreads the clutch slave cylinder bleed process. The location of the cylinder and the position of the bleed valve are such that it almost seems as if the designers went out of their way to make the procedure difficult! Over the years owners have devised various ways of making the process a little easier by making the slave valve itself less troublesome to remove, and bleeding with the valve dangling off the bell housing. I used to do it that way. Also, there have been remote bleed valve kits, whose availability seems to come and go. I have recently come across a kit that works well, and the following text explains its installation including a tip on improving the ease of use of the valve.

The product in question is the Remote Steel Braided Clutch Bleed Kit offered by Ol Phartz Partz in Banning CA. Part number AHSCBL2K, at olphartz.com.

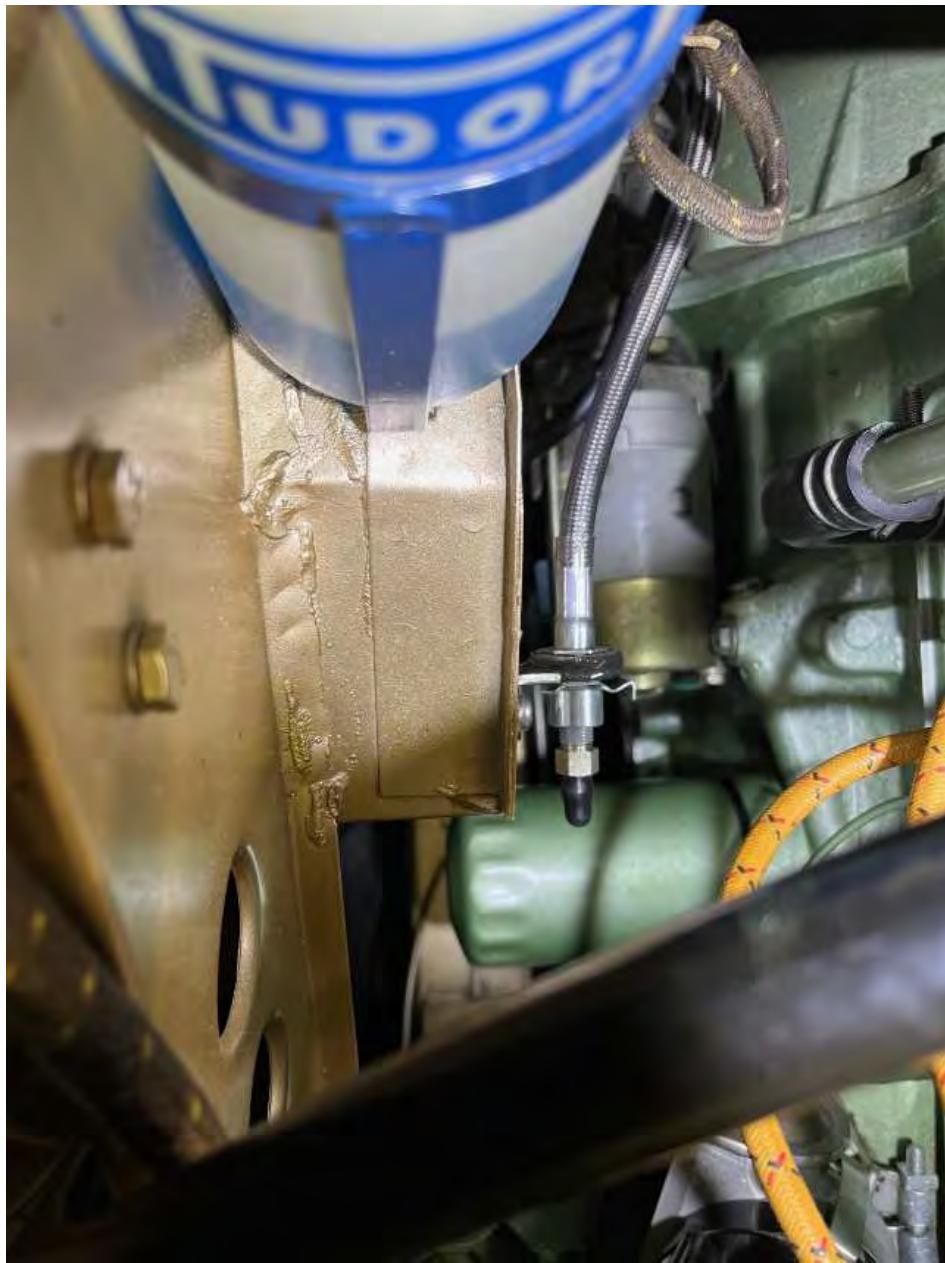


The kit includes a steel braided hose with fittings of high quality, a location attachment clip for the engine compartment and a Speed Bleeder, which does not require opening and closing the valve between pumps. I should mention that not everyone likes the Speed Bleeder concept, and a conventional bleed valve could also be used if you prefer.

The photo below shows the attachment, under the car, of the end of the kit's hose to the slave cylinder. It's necessary to remove the cylinder to make this connection. Once that's done the hose can be fed up to a convenient attachment point for the other end in the engine compartment.



This next photo shows where I mounted the other end in the engine compartment of my BJ8.



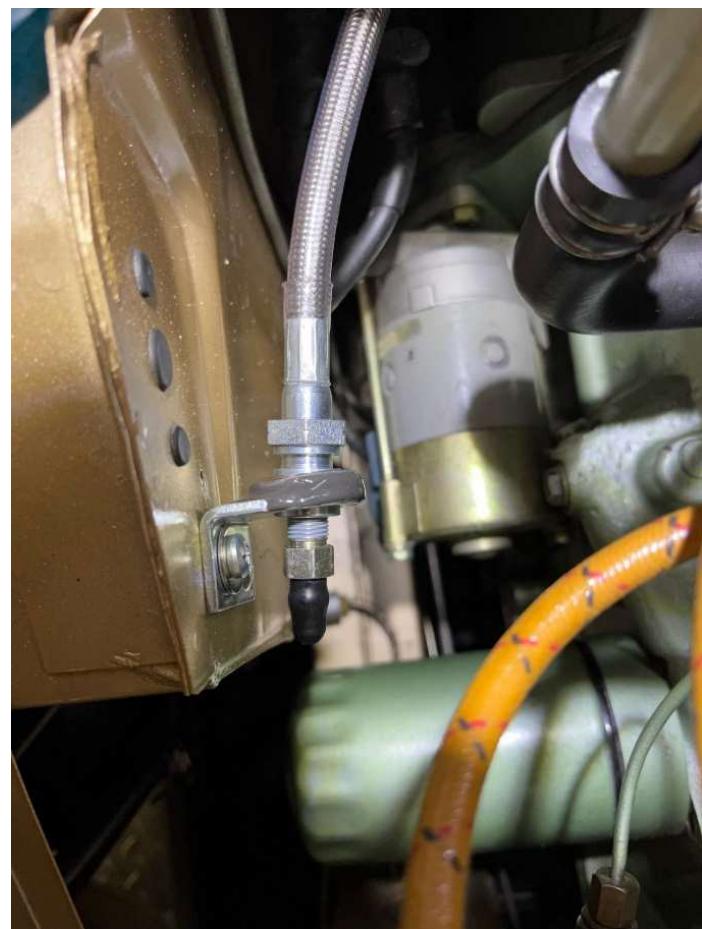
The bleed process went as advertised, with the speed bleed valve eliminating the need for opening and closing the bleed valve between pumps.

My only minor complaint is that to open and close the bleed valve you must hold the 18mm hex nut, on the hose side of the mounting bracket, with an open-end wrench to prevent the hose from turning while opening or closing the 7/16" speed bleeder hex. The little clip provided didn't hold the hose from turning when you turn the bleed valve.

Before I go on to my ultimate solution to this inconvenience, let me offer the easy tip first - don't mount the bracket such that it positions the bleed valve facing upwards, in a vertical position.

You may be inclined to do so as it seems natural when snaking the hose up to the engine compartment from the slave cylinder. Rather, mount it so that the valve is positioned horizontally and parallel to the ground as in the photo above. While this doesn't eliminate the need to hold the 18mm fitting, it makes it much easier to do. Secondly, this also makes the bleeding process easier as the hose and fluid don't point straight up, which allows for neater fluid collection.

Now, if you want the complicated fix, which makes this a true one wrench operation, here we go. Take an 18mm socket, cut off the tip and JB Weld it to the back of the bracket supplied with the part. Then, when the hose is clipped into the bracket, the 18mm hex fitting slips into the socket tip and is held from turning while the bleed valve is opened and closed. See photos below.

Auction Report

We have a very interesting Bugeye this month. A largely unrestored 1958 Bugeye sold for \$42k, including the buyer's premium, on Bring a Trailer (BaT). That is one of the highest Bugeye prices I have seen, if not the highest. The seller tried to sell the car in 2022 on BaT, when it failed to sell with a high bid of \$24.2k. This time around it did much better, which is rare for on-line auctions.

Of course, what makes this car unusual is its ownership history (2 owners, the first for 60 years) and the fact that it is largely unrestored. I say "largely" because it has had significant mechanical refurbishment, including an engine rebuild. Is it a survivor in the collector sense?

Cosmetically it certainly looks the part and appears to be a solid car having spent nearly all of its life in CA. These early Bugeyes have a few unique build characteristics, which are nicely outlined by the seller in the auction comments. It's an interesting read if you want to dig deeper into this very rare example. I encourage you to do so because a car like this may never cross the block again.

Auction Report

Our next car is a recently restored 1967 BJ8 – one of the original Metallic Golden Beige (MGB) cars, which sold for \$74.55k, including the buyer's premium, on BaT.

Being the owner of one of the original MGB cars, I was naturally drawn to this sale. There were ~550 of these cars built, and only in 1967. Most of them (~500) came to the US. The color wasn't very popular when released and many were repainted early in their life. Decades later the color became very popular, helped by several non-original MGB cars offered by well-known Healey restorer Kurt Tanner on Barrett Jackson live TV auctions. It is often quipped that of the 550 originally built a few thousand still exist!

So, a genuine MGB BJ8 is fairly rare, rarer than a 100M, and this car appears to be a fine example. The luster is off most Healeys, and the rare ones are no exception. A very nice recently restored Healey-blue-over-white BJ8 sold last month on BaT for \$78.75k (including the buyer's premium). So, I see no premium here for the rarity of the color. Having said that, this car may have been hurt by a few upgrades, including a 5-speed trans, a little bruise on the rear shroud and steel wheels.

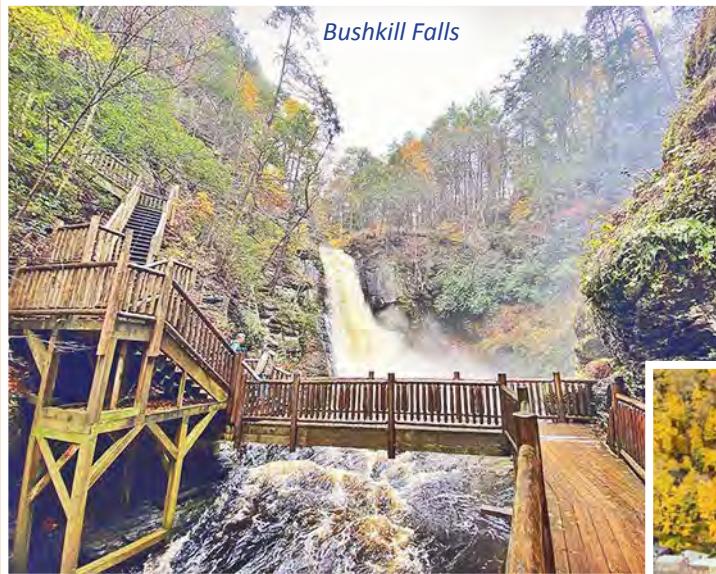
Bushkill Falls is known as the "Niagara of Pennsylvania." This series of eight waterfalls is a must-see for nature lovers.

We may add more and change some of the destinations. However, we can promise you that you will have some wonderful drives in the beautiful Pocono Mountains. We look forward to seeing you there.



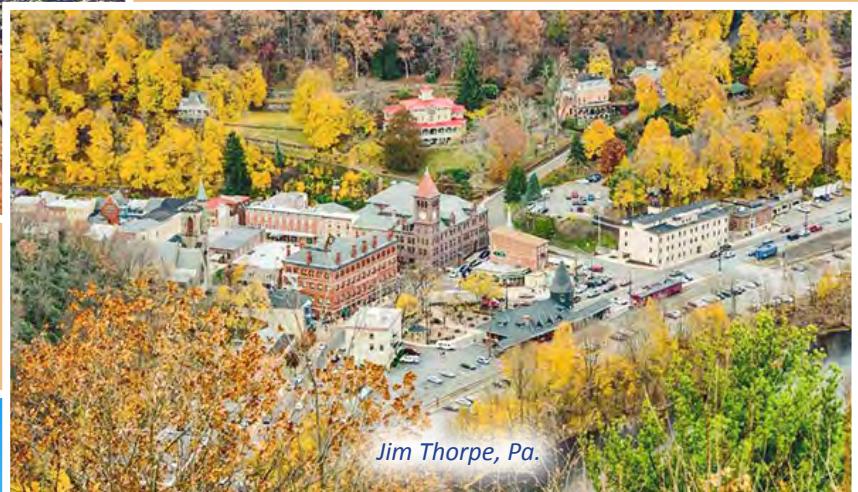

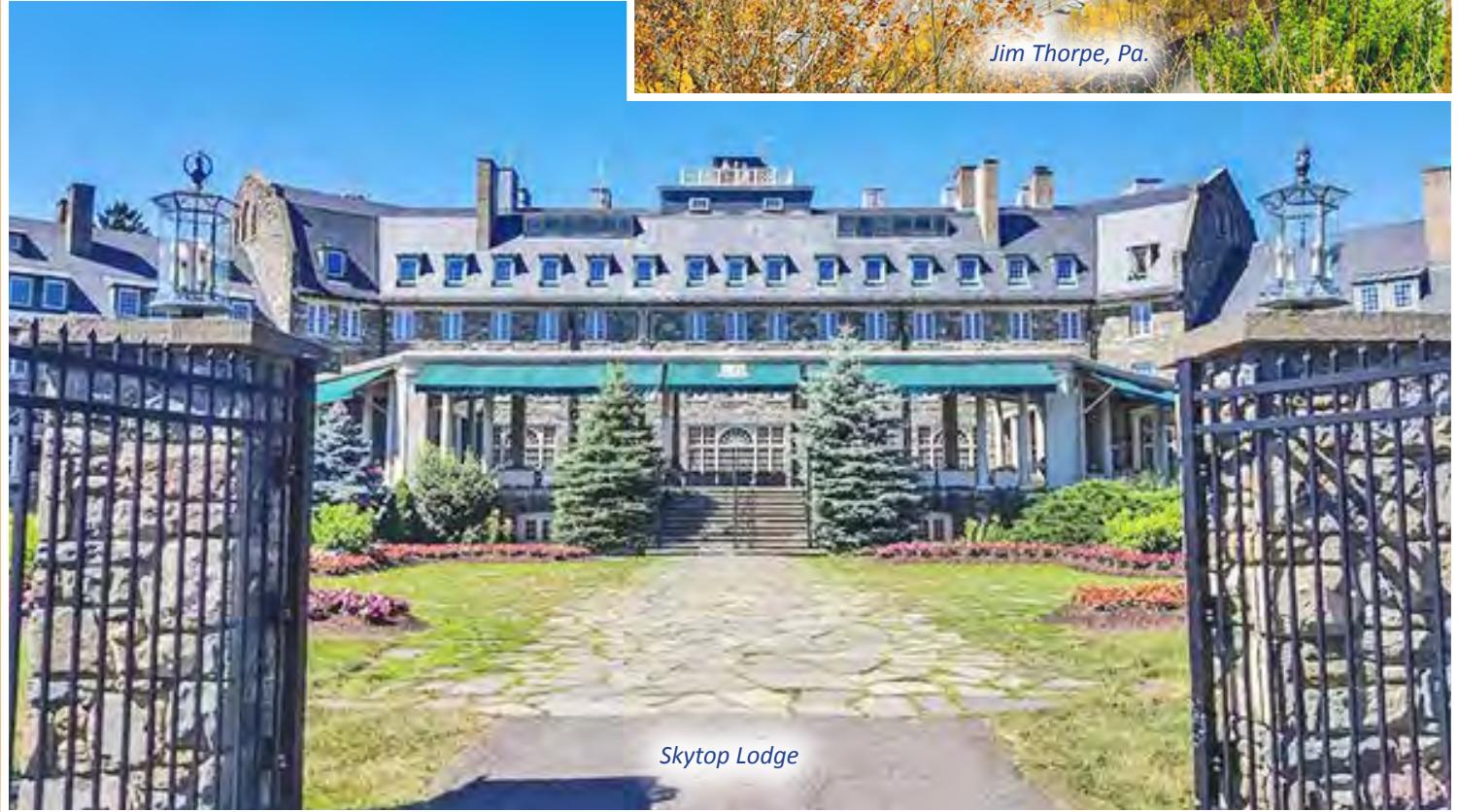

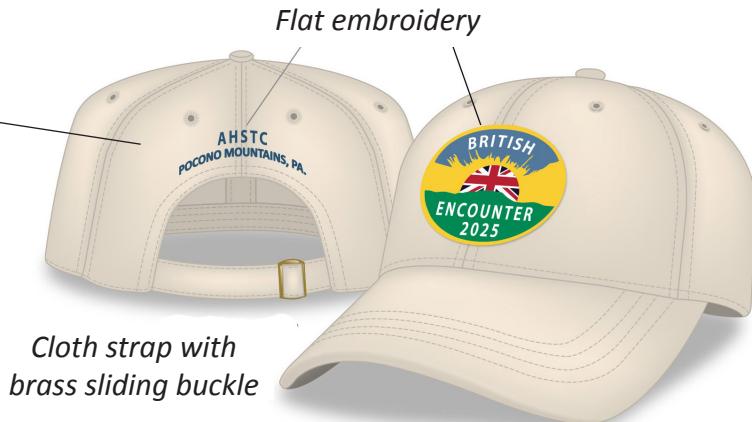
